Volunteer Strathcona has been a leader in community building for over 46 years, and has done so by changing in response to the community's changing needs.

As we emerge from the isolation of the last few years, we find ourselves again looking to the community for guidance on how we can best serve. What we've been hearing from community partners, educators, and residents is that people want to collaborate, create stronger networks, and they want to belong.

Volunteer Strathcona is supporting that growth by fostering dynamic collaborations, and innovating opportunities for new volunteers to join in on the fun. Students from Sherwood Heights' leadership classes have teamed up with WeCan Food Baskets in order to meet the program's growing needs. Hockey teams have shown up with shovels and put their on-ice experience to good use as volunteers with our SnowBusters programs. And as we lean into these new pools of volunteers, we know it is just the beginning.

Our team is offering sector support via grant access, volunteer recruitment, and event consultations to festivals, local sports associations, and community groups like the Friends of the Strathcona County Library.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

To say that the past couple of years have been a challenge for most nonprofit organizations in our community could be considered a bit of understatement. The pandemic changed many things, the way we work, the way we socialize and definitely the way we volunteer.

This is certainly true for Volunteer Strathcona. Throughout the first two years of the pandemic hundreds of our neighbours came to the rescue of the elderly and those unable to complete certain outdoor tasks on their own, those struggling with isolation and loneliness, those struggling with food insecurity. It was particularly heartwarming to experience the whirlwind that the volunteers in our community created as they gladly and unselfishly donated countless hours in community service. It was also heartwarming to watch our staff feel satisfied with a job well done as they reached out to the community and matched volunteers to those in need of service. And as our resident clients move on and require less assistance, Volunteer Strathcona, an incredibly resilient organization, is moving on as well. We are very encouraged by the number of local organizations that reached out for help in 2022. Examples include the Highlands Gathering, Ravenwood, A Safe Place and of course our collaboration partner Linking Generations. Our ability to provide excellent sector support is evidenced by the number of groups reaching out for advice on volunteer management, including recruitment, screening, training, and recognition and as the need for direct delivery programming dissipates, we will pivot once again.

A highlight for me personally was being recognized for the successes Volunteer Strathcona experienced under my leadership, through the presentation of a Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee Medal from MLA Nate Glubish. I was truly honoured and will feel the positive effect this will have for me for many years to come.

My time with Volunteer Strathcona is coming to an end as I am scheduled to retire from nonprofit leadership in the spring of 2023. Looking forward to the year ahead, I know that Volunteer Strathcona will continue to work in the community, will handle any and all challenges associated with an ever changing landscape with the same tenacity and grace as we have over the past six years.




Caron Stoltz (April 11, 1969 – March 10, 2022)

TAX CLINICS: TINY TEAM, HUGE IMPACT!

11 volunteers prepared 215 tax returns for 198 low-income Strathcona County residents in just under two months.

Telephone, virtual and drop-off appointments were all available, and the financial impact of their 232+ hours was \$572, 091.

Benefits received were: income tax refunds, Canada Child Benefits, GST refunds, and Climate Action Incentives.


